AS YOU SAY GOODBYE TO AUTUMN, winterizing your vehicle should be a top priority. The non-profit Car Care Council recommends that motorists perform a 6-point winter maintenance check of areas that have direct impact on winter driving. "Harsh winter weather can stress out a vehicle, as well as its driver," says Rich White, Executive Director, Car Care Council. "A vehicle that is properly prepared for the elements can help you avoid an unplanned road emergency when the weather takes a sudden turn for the worse." 1. BATTERY - Cold weather is hard on batteries, so it's wise to check the battery & charging system for optimum performance. Because batteries don't always give warning signs before they fail, it is advisable to replace batteries that are more than 3 years old.

2. ANTIFREEZE – Antifreeze (coolant) should be flushed & refilled at least every 2 years in most vehicles. Do not add 100% antifreeze as full-strength antifreeze actually has a lower freeze point than when it's mixed with water.

3. BRAKES - Have the brake system checked. Brakes are critical to vehicle safety & particularly important when driving on icy or snow-covered roads.

4. TIRES - Check the tire tread depth & tire pressure, including the spare. If snow & ice are a problem in your area, consider special tires designed to grip slick roads. During winter, tire pressure should be checked weekly as tires lose pressure when temperatures drop. 5. OIL - Be diligent about changing the oil at recommended intervals & check the fuel, air & transmission filters at the same time.

6. LIGHTS & WIPERS - Make sure all exterior & interior lights are working so you can see & be seen. Check the fluid level in the windshield washer reservoir & replace wiper blades that are torn, cracked or don't properly clean your windshield.

In addition, the council recommends a thorough Vehicle Inspection by a trusted professional as winter magnifies existing problems such as pings, hard starts, sluggish performance & rough idling.

The New Year is approaching, a time when millions of people will celebrate with food, new esolutions or perhaps a kiss as the clock strikes twelve. But how much do you know about the holiday? Here are 6 fun facts about New Year's.

1. The first New Year's celebration dates back 4,000 years. Julius Caesar, the emperor of Rome, was the first to declare Jan. 1 a national holiday. He named the month after Janus, the Roman god of doors and gates.

2. Forty-five percent of Americans make New Year's resolutions. The top resolutions are to lose weight, get organized, spend less and save more, stay fit and healthy, and to quit smoking.

3. Be sure to eat leafy greens on New Year's. Tradition says that the more leafy greens a person eats, the more prosperity he or she will experience.

4. Many people ring in New Year's by popping open a bottle of champagne. Americans drink close to 360 million glasses of the bubbly during this time.

#### A Season Of Celebration For All

CHRISTMAS is the Christian festival celebrating the birth of Jesus. Since the early 20th century, Christmas has also been a secular family holiday, observed by Christians and non-Christians alike, and marked by an increasingly elaborate exchange of gifts. In this secular Christmas celebration, a mythical figure named Santa Claus plays the pivotal role.
